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STRATEGIC REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

The directors present the strategic report for the year ended 31 March 2022.

Fair review of the business

The company continued its principle activities throughout the current year.

Principal risks and uncertainties

Reduction in Consumer and Business Purchasing

We depend on our customers - large communication service providers ("CSPs"). If our primary customers face reduced revenue, we will also face reduced revenue. CSPs primary customers are consumers and businesses. Of course, reductions in spending by consumers or businesses will reduce revenue of CSPs. And, this will result in decreased spending by the CSPs which means reduced revenue for us.

Security

Information is the lifeblood of the business. The focus is on how to protect data, making it available to right people when it is required to make certain decisions or use it in the work environment to provide required delivery or service. Security and risk management framework provides confidence to customers ensuring that adequate control measures are in place to secure data. Best practices on information classification and handling of data based on the criticality and availability of data.

Protecting the Company's Intellectual Property

The telecom software industry is characterised to a large extent by its reliance on proprietary technology. The Company and its subsidiaries own or have licenses to use the technologies embedded in its products. The Company depends on a combination of technical innovations, copyrights, trade secrets and non-disclosure agreements for the protection of this technology. The Company and its subsidiaries also maintain patent and trademarks, and patent and trademark applications, as it deems appropriate. The Company and its subsidiaries also have copyrights vested in their software products and related materials. However, as is common industry practice, the Company has not generally pursued registrations of its copyrights.

Variability of Quarterly Operating Results

The quarterly operating results of the Company have varied in the past due to reasons like seasonal pattern of hardware and software capital spending by customers, information technology investment trends, achievement of milestones in the execution of projects, hiring of additional staff and timing and integration of acquired businesses. Hence, the past operating results and period to period comparisons may not indicate future performance. The management is attempting to mitigate this risk through expansion of client base geographically and increase of steady annuity revenue through Managed Services model.

Contractual Obligation

In contracts entered into by Subex with its customers in the ordinary course of business, it is obliged to perform and act according to the contractual terms and regulations. Failure to fulfill the contractual obligations arising out of such contracts may expose Subex to financial and other risks.

The management has taken sufficient measures to cover what it believes to be its contractual risks and does not foresee any major liability due to its non fulfillment of any contractual terms and conditions.

STRATEGIC REPORT (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

Economic downturn

The company acknowledges the importance of maintaining close relationships with its key customers in order to be able to identify the early signs of potential financial difficulties. Sales trends in its major markets are constantly reviewed to enable early action to be taken in the event of sales declining.

Particular attention has been paid to the effects of Covid-19 and the impact this has had on the company during the year. We have continued to retain most of our key customer relationships and experienced no issues in recovering amounts due from customers during the year except for very few customers wherein there was impact on implementation revenue because of non-presence of implementation engineers due to lockdown in the region. However, this is only deferment of efforts and the corresponding revenue and does not seem to be any permanent downturn. Otherwise, our work output has not been majorly adversely impacted during the year as a result of restrictions in place and we foresee no issues presented with Covid-19, as the company and wider group has a strong business continuity plan in place. Another reason of declining revenue is on account of the Cyber attack which has caused the servers and the systems to be shutdown near to a month in Quarter 3. Because of this incident, implementation was on hold affecting the revenues for that period. However, this is a deferment of corresponding revenues which has been and/or in process of recovering back. The Company has put several strict control in place to avoid and mitigate any future incidence of this nature.

Conflicts with Ukraine

The company has considered the potential implications of the current conflict between Ukraine and Russia. Subex UK (Limited) do not currently hold any customers or suppliers with either country and therefore consider there to have been no adverse implications as a result of the conflict.

Development and performance

During the financial year ended March 31, 2022, the total revenue on a standalone basis was £18,601 (£'000) as against the revenue for the previous year which was £21,505 (£'000). The Company has during the year under review resulted in a loss of £81 (£'000) as against a profit of £2,497 (£'000) in the previous year.

Management uses a range of performance measures to monitor and manage the business. The performance measures are split into financial and non financial key performance indicators as set out below:

The directors present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2022.

Principal activities

The Company's Ultimate Holding Company Subex Limited is a leading global provider of Business and Operations Support Systems (B/OSS) that empowers communications service providers (CSPs) to achieve competitive advantage through Business and CAPEX Optimisation - thereby enabling them to improve their operational efficiency to deliver enhanced service experiences to subscribers.

Subex Limited pioneered the concept of a Revenue Operations Center (ROC®) – a centralized approach that sustains profitable growth and financial health through coordinated operational control. Subex's product portfolio powers the ROC and its best-in-class solutions such as revenue assurance, fraud management, asset assurance, capacity management, data integrity management, credit risk management, cost management, route optimization and partner settlement. Subex also offers a scalable Managed Services program with 30 + customers.

Subex has been awarded the Global Market Share Leader in Financial Assurance 2012 by Frost & Sullivan and has been the winner of Pipeline Innovation Award 2013 in Business Intelligence & Analytics; Capacity Magazine Best Product/ Service 2013. Subex has continued to innovate with customers and have been jointly awarded the Global Telecoms Business Innovation Award 2014 along with Telstra Global; in 2012 with Idea Cellular for Managed Services and in 2011 with Swisscom for Fraud Management.

Subex's customers include 29 of top 50 operators* and 33 of the world's 50 biggest** telecommunications service providers worldwide. The company has more than 300 installations across 70 countries (*Total Telecom Top 500 Telecom Brands, 2013 and **Forbes' Global 2000 list, 2014).

Financial instruments

Financial Risk Management

The company's operations expose it to a variety of financial risks that include the effects of changes in debt market prices credit risk, liquidity risk and interest rate risk. The company has in place a risk management programme that seeks to limit the adverse effects on the financial performance of the company by monitoring the levels of debt finance and related finance costs. The company does not use derivative financial instruments to manage interest rate costs and as such no hedge accounting is applied.

Given the size of the company, the directors have not delegated the responsibility of monitoring financial risk management to a sub committee of the board. The policies set by the board of directors are implemented by the company's finance department. The department has a policy that sets out specific guidelines to manage interest rate risk, credit risk and circumstances where it would be appropriate to use financial instruments to manage these.

Liquidity risk

The company is supported by its parent in the event of a short or medium term requirement for its operating activities. The company has a policy of only entering into additional debt finance arrangement when a contractual binding sale has been written.

The board and the management committee monitor the company's progress against its business objectives and financial performance on a regular basis. The company uses revenue, cost of operations and free cash as a means of financial performance indicator.

The company highly values its customers and uses customer satisfaction surveys and feedback across all regions to track customer satisfaction and retention.

Credit risk

The company has implemented policies that require appropriate credit checks on potential customers before sale are made. The amount of exposure to any individual counterparty is subject to a limit, which is reassessed annually by the board.

Price risk

The company is exposed to price risk as a result of its operations in the Telecoms OSS market. The company's exposure to market price risk is assessed by its ultimate parent undertaking in conjunction with other group companies.

Future developments

The group intends to pursue the business strategy of researching, developing and selling software and services to telecom operators.

Auditor

The auditors, Ensors Accountants LLP, are deemed to be reappointed under section 487(2) of the Companies Act 2006.

Statement of disclosure to auditor

So far as each person who was a director at the date of approving this report is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the company's auditor is unaware. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

1 Accounting policies

Company information

Subex (UK) Limited is a private company limited by shares incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is First Floor Rama Apartments, 17 St. Anns Road, Harrow, Middlesex, HA1 1JU.

1.1 Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling (GBP), The functional currency is US\$. This was changed on the 1st April 2021 to better reflect the transactions of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £'000.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

This company is a qualifying entity for the purposes of FRS 102, being a member of a group where the parent of that group prepares publicly available consolidated financial statements, including this company, which are intended to give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities, financial position and profit or loss of the group. The company has therefore taken advantage of exemptions from the following disclosure requirements:

- Section 4 'Statement of Financial Position' Reconciliation of the opening and closing number of shares:
- Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instrument Issues' –
 Carrying amounts, interest income/expense and net gains/losses for each category of financial

The financial statements of the company are consolidated in the financial statements of Subex Limited. These consolidated financial statements are available from its registered office, RMZ Ecoworld, Outer Ring Road, Devarabisanahalli, Bangalore - 560 103, Karnataka, India.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption under section 401 of the Companies Act 2006 not to prepare consolidated accounts. The financial statements present information about the company as an individual entity and not about its group.

Subex (UK) Limited is a wholly owned subsidiary of Subex Limited and the results of Subex (UK) Limited are included in the consolidated financial statements of Subex Limited which are publically available.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the directors continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Turnover

Revenue represents the amount derived from customers for goods and services provided, excluding value added tax.

Implementation, consultancy and development services

Implementation, consultancy and development services are generally fixed price contracts or are invoiced on a time and materials basis. Revenue and profit on fixed price contracts are recognised in accordance with long term accounting principles set out in SSAP 9 reflecting percentage of completion method. Profit is not recognised until all fundamental performance hurdles have been overcome. Revenue in respect of time and materials contracts is recognised as the work is performed. Where the implementation services offered by the company in respect of these arrangements are not essential to the functionality of the software this can be performed by other suppliers, these are described in the arrangement such that the total price of the arrangement would be expected to vary as a result of the inclusion or exclusion of these services, these services are accounted for as a separate element of the arrangement.

Maintenance and support contracts

Revenues related to significant post contract support agreements (e.g. maintenance) are deferred and recognised on a straight line basis over the period of the agreements. Where the company sells software which includes a significant element of customer specific development and the service portion cannot be separated from the contract as a whole, the entire arrangement including the software component is accounted for as a long term contract.

Hosting services

Hosting services are accounted for in accordance with usage either based on a quarterly budget order or in accordance with the original contract.

Software sales

Sales of software products are recognised on delivery provided no significant vendor obligations remain with the exception of own product term licence and support agreements.

Licences and subscriptions

When sold separately, revenue from the sale of additional software licences are recognised on the transfer of such licences.

Licences incorporated into a total contract price are deferred and recognised in accordance with the percentage of completion method.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Land and buildings Leasehold 3 to 5 years
Fixtures, fittings & equipment 2 to 5 years
Computer equipment 2 to 4 years

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is credited or charged to profit or loss.

1.5 Fixed asset investments

Interests in subsidiaries, associates and jointly controlled entities are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost less any accumulated impairment losses. The investments are assessed for impairment at each reporting date and any impairment losses or reversals of impairment losses are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

1.6 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting period end date, the company reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are basic financial assets and include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.8 Financial instruments

The company has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the company's statement of financial position when the company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Other financial assets

Other financial assets, including investments in equity instruments which are not subsidiaries, associates or joint ventures, are initially measured at fair value, which is normally the transaction price. Such assets are subsequently carried at fair value and the changes in fair value are recognised in profit or loss, except that investments in equity instruments that are not publicly traded and whose fair values cannot be measured reliably are measured at cost less impairment.

Impairment of financial assets

Financial assets, other than those held at fair value through profit and loss, are assessed for indicators of impairment at each reporting end date.

Financial assets are impaired where there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the financial asset, the estimated future cash flows have been affected. If an asset is impaired, the impairment loss is the difference between the carrying amount and the present value of the estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. The impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

If there is a decrease in the impairment loss arising from an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the impairment is reversed. The reversal is such that the current carrying amount does not exceed what the carrying amount would have been, had the impairment not previously been recognised. The impairment reversal is recognised in profit or loss.

Derecognition of financial assets

Financial assets are derecognised only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire or are settled, or when the company transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to another entity, or if some significant risks and rewards of ownership are retained but control of the asset has transferred to another party that is able to sell the asset in its entirety to an unrelated third party.

Classification of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities.

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors, bank loans, loans from fellow group companies and preference shares that are classified as debt, are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Other financial liabilities

Derivatives, including interest rate swaps and forward foreign exchange contracts, are not basic financial instruments. Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at their fair value. Changes in the fair value of derivatives are recognised in profit or loss in finance costs or finance income as appropriate, unless hedge accounting is applied and the hedge is a cash flow hedge.

Debt instruments that do not meet the conditions in FRS 102 paragraph 11.9 are subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss. Debt instruments may be designated as being measured at fair value through profit or loss to eliminate or reduce an accounting mismatch or if the instruments are measured and their performance evaluated on a fair value basis in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the company's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.9 Equity instruments

Equity instruments issued by the company are recorded at the proceeds received, net of transaction costs. Dividends payable on equity instruments are recognised as liabilities once they are no longer at the discretion of the company.

Changes in the fair value of derivatives that are designated and qualify as fair value hedges are recognised in profit or loss immediately, together with any changes in the fair value of the hedged asset or liability that are attributable to the hedged risk.

1.10 Taxation

The tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

Current tax

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from net profit as reported in the income statement because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items that are never taxable or deductible. The company's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting end date.

Deferred tax

Deferred taxation is provided in full in respect of taxation deferred by timing differences between the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes. The deferred tax balance has not been discounted.

Deferred tax assets are recognised when its more likely than not that they will be recovered. Deferred tax is measure using rate of tax that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the balance sheet date.

1.11 Employee benefits

The costs of short-term employee benefits are recognised as a liability and an expense, unless those costs are required to be recognised as part of the cost of stock or fixed assets.

Where material, the cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the company is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.12 Retirement benefits

Defined contribution scheme

The company operates a defined contribution scheme for the benefit of its employees. Contributions payable are charged to the profit and loss account in the year they are payable.

1.13 Leases

Rentals payable under operating leases, including any lease incentives received, are charged to profit or loss on a straight line basis over the term of the relevant lease except where another more systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leases asset are consumed.

1.14 Employee share schemes

The cost of awards to employees that take the form of shares or rights to shares is recognised over the period of the vesting of the shares. Employees have been awarded shares under the ESOP plan of the parent Subex Limited and the same is valued using the Black and Scholes model for valuing options. The cost of the share scheme is recognised in the profit and loss account and a credit is recognised in equity being a capital contribution from the parent undertaking.

2 Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The estimates and assumptions which have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities are as follows.

Impairment of debtors

The company makes an estimate of the recoverable value of trade and other debtors. When assessing impairment of trade and other debtors, management considers factors including the current credit rating of the customer, the ageing profile of debtors, whether covered by insurance and historical experience.
